EV Charging Rollout

A European electric mobility company, Jolt Energy, aimed to introduce fast, curbside EV charging stations into major U.S. cities but lacked the local expertise to penetrate the market. The Pataki Cahill Group provided strategic guidance on site selection and fostered partnerships with city authorities, enabling the deployment of a network of charging stations. This initiative aligned with New York State's commitment to expanding EV infrastructure, as evidenced by Governor Kathy Hochul's announcement of a \$60 million investment to accelerate EV charging infrastructure deployment across New York City.





CASE STUDY



Project: Champlain Hudson Power Express (CHPE)

Type: Clean energy transmission

Location: Quebec, Canada to New York, New York

Timeline: 2008-2026

Back in 2008, the idea seemed almost too ambitious to be real: build a 339-mile power line stretching from Canada to the heart of New York City—mostly underwater and underground—to deliver enough clean hydropower to power over a million homes.

The project, called the Champlain Hudson Power Express (CHPE), promised massive carbon reductions and grid stability. But bold vision wasn't the hard part. It was everything that came after.

How do you move a project of that scale through layers of federal, state, and local approvals—across multiple jurisdictions, landowners, and political agendas? How do you calm fears, navigate permits, and align a dozen different stakeholders?

That's when the CHPE team brought in the Pataki Cahill Group.

With decades of experience in government, environmental law, and infrastructure, Pataki and Cahill knew exactly what it would take—not just to move the project forward, but to do it in a way that respected communities, policy, and the planet.

They aligned the plan with New York's climate goals. They worked with regulators, utilities, investors, and community groups. They didn't bulldoze obstacles—they built relationships around them.

In 2022, construction began. By 2026, CHPE will deliver 1,200 megawatts of clean energy straight into New York City—cutting 4 million metric tons of CO₂ every year.

That's roughly equivalent to removing about 870,000 gasoline-powered passenger vehicles from the road annually.

What could've been a cautionary tale of red tape is now a flagship for what's possible when vision meets execution—and when the right partners are at the table.
